

1ST ITINERARY:**Visit of Victoria**

Victoria, the smallest capital in the world is the economic and administrative centre of the islands, a typical lively Creole town, a melting pot of different races and cultures. Its tourist and commercial harbours are used by a constant traffic of boats, ferries, yachts and transport and cruise ships, from every part of the world. We suggest that you spend at least half a day in Victoria.

The **market** is characteristic and offers local products, fish of every kind, fruit and vegetables as well as a great assortment of spices, much used in Creole cooking.

To see in the city: the **Historical Museum** in Independence Avenue, the **Clock Tower**, or Little Ben, a miniature copy of London's famous Big Ben, the **Cathedral** of the Immaculate Conception, the **Roman Catholic Mission**, the **National Library**, the **Trianon**, which today hosts the Marie Antoinette Restaurant, with its excellent Creole menu. Visit the **Pirates Arms**, a bar-veranda with its typical tropical atmosphere, a place for meeting and refreshment. While you have the chance we suggest you also to visit the **Botanical Gardens**, near the Hospital, one of the first in the world, with its rich variety of plants, among which the **Coco de Mer**.

**2ND ITINERARY:****Victoria-Sans Souci Port Glaud - Ile Therese**

Starting from Victoria, take the Sans Souci road that crosses the mountain to arrive in Port Glaud. During the journey you will pass by the **Mission**, the old site of a mission, with its spectacular avenue of "**Sangdragon**", so-called because of their blood-coloured lymph. You then go through vast tea plantations. You can stop at the **Tea Tavern**, where you can taste excellent tea and you can visit the plantation (mornings only). Having arrived at **Port Glaud**, turn right towards **Port Launay**, along a road rich in beautiful small beaches. In Port Glaud you can take a boat for **Ile Therese**, with its splendid beach whose sea bottom is populated by a huge quantity of fish of every kind. Here too there is a refreshment point.
